*W*e’ve always known that we have the best donors and supporters around, but this winter your dedication to our mission shone through during a dramatic series of events.

On the last day of January, when the Susan G. Komen Foundation announced that it would stop providing funds for breast cancer screenings at Planned Parenthoods nationwide, you raised your voices up to the sky. A local anonymous donor issued a \$300,000 challenge grant in February, and *you helped us to meet that match in less than five weeks.*

We were thrilled to have more than 500 of you join us at our 46th Annual Dinner Celebration on March 6. Your sponsorships, attendance, participation in our Condom Grab Bag and

enthusiastic bidding at our Silent Auction helped to raise more than \$140,000 for the event. [A full write-up about the evening is on page 10.]

Finally, after only a few weeks’ rest, you joined us in The Giving Challenge, a fundraising event sponsored by local foundations. More than 250 unique donors contributed \$42,572 in individual gifts, qualifying us for over \$7,500 in bonus and matching grants. After all of the additional awards and grants were totaled, we had raised more than \$55,000. We offer our thanks to the Community Foundation of Sarasota County, Gulf Coast Community Foundation, Manatee Community Foundation, and the Patterson Foundation for this amazing opportunity.

And thank **you** for making this challenging year one of our most successful.

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Dear Friends,

As this roller-coaster of our fiscal year winds down, I can't help but sigh – it feels like every letter I've written to you in recent memory has started along the same lines: "Oh what a year it has been." It wouldn't be wrong to again start this message the same way.

From the national fight for Planned Parenthood's life last spring against Congressional efforts to defund Planned Parenthood and all family planning programs; to this winter's Komen Foundation defunding controversy; to battles in state legislatures across the U.S. (and most definitely in Florida!) for women's access to health care; to the continued battle with the Catholic Church and Congress for birth control coverage with no co-pay . . . it's been one step forward and three steps back. At times the fight is exhausting. But I assure you: we will NEVER give up. Our patients – we provided more than 77,000 patient visits this year – need us.

Because it's easy to become wrapped up in a "battleground mentality" given current events, I would like to refocus the conversation on what we have been able to do – with your support – for our patients:

Nationally, our health centers serve three million patients every year. Women and their families come to us for lifesaving cancer screenings for cervical and breast cancer (we are one of the largest cancer screeners in the nation); prevention and treatment of sexually transmitted diseases; birth control; comprehensive gynecological exams; HIV testing; vasectomies; and educational health counseling.

Planned Parenthood is here for moms and dads who might be uncertain about – or just don't know how – to talk to their teens about sex. We're here for schools and young people who need sex education programs that address topics from abstinence to birth control. We're here to protect teens and encourage them to talk with their parents.

Planned Parenthood is an essential community health care provider, with 800 health centers across the country, 24 of which are right here in Florida. And our affiliate serves patients in seven health centers – in Tampa, St. Petersburg, Bradenton, Lakeland, Winter Haven, Sarasota and Ft. Myers.

Thank YOU for helping us be here for the women, men and families who need us. Thank you for continuing to stand with Planned Parenthood. After almost 100 years, with your support we will be here for our patients – no matter what!

Report on the 2012 Florida State Legislature

Here in Florida, the war on women is in high gear. In 2011, we saw 18 invasive, dangerous, and offensive anti-choice bills filed in the Florida Legislature. The Governor signed four of them into law, while a fifth will be placed on our 2012 ballot – an amendment to the Florida constitution that hurts women’s health and privacy protections.

As if that wasn’t enough, this year nine anti-choice bills were introduced during Florida’s legislative session. We are very happy to report, however, that the 2012 Legislative session ended without any anti-choice bills being passed – even though the anti-choice politicians tried hard. Bills that would have endangered women’s health did pass out of Florida House and Senate committees, and anti-choice leadership tried to break protocol to cram legislation through in the final days of session. But because our supporters stood strong with Planned Parenthood and contacted their elected officials to let them know that women’s health matters, we were able to beat back all the anti-choice bills this year. A big “thank you” to all of our wonderful advocates!

The national war on women

At the state and federal levels, we are witnessing one of the most devastating legislative assaults on women’s health care ever. Last year more than 1,000 anti-choice bills were introduced in state legislatures across the country. The U.S. House of Representatives, currently dominated by anti-choice politicians, not only tried to defund America’s family planning program (Title X), they attempted to prohibit Planned Parenthood from receiving any federal funds whatsoever – funds that help prevent

unintended pregnancies and sexually transmitted diseases, and detect breast and cervical cancer early. This year, even birth control is an issue, with the U.S. House of Representatives voting to allow employers to deny women insurance coverage for birth control. Thankfully, the U.S. Senate voted against this attempt and the bill failed.

Whether they are here in the Florida State House or up in the U.S. Capitol, anti-choice elected politicians have been playing a cruel game of politics at the expense of women’s health.



More than 100 advocates from across Florida traveled to Tallahassee in late February for Planned Parenthood’s annual Lobby Day. A rousing press conference was held on the steps of the Old Capitol with some of the dedicated pro-choice legislators who “Stand with Planned Parenthood!”

Vote **NO** on Amendment 6!

One of Planned Parenthood's highest priorities for the coming election is the defeat of Amendment 6, an attempt to change Florida's Constitution. This amendment would erode a woman's privacy rights. The Florida Constitution currently contains a very strong right to privacy – much stronger, in fact, than is contained in the U.S. Constitution. Amendment 6 would abolish this right as it pertains to women's abortion rights and many surrounding issues. It is an unconscionable attempt to deny women their rights, and it must be defeated on Nov. 6!

Planned Parenthood will need everyone's help over the next six months in the fight against this amendment. Amendment 6 would allow the politicians in Tallahassee to interfere with a woman's personal decision-making and to put a woman's health in danger by not giving her all the options she has the right to have.

We urge our supporters to help us raise voters' awareness of this dangerous amendment – and to urge everyone to VOTE NO on Amendment 6 in order to protect Florida women's health.

A radical, rollicking retirement

Wendy Sears Grassi, Director of Public Affairs at Planned Parenthood since 1996, recently announced her retirement. CEO Barbara Zdravceky says, “Wendy has been a tireless advocate for women’s health access over the years and has inspired thousands of activists of all ages to stand with Planned Parenthood, no matter what. She has built a small army of committed volunteers who mobilize to rally, participate in phone banks, write letters to the editor, email legislators, organize press conferences and, most importantly, VOTE.”

She continues, “Wendy has been the face of Planned Parenthood on the ground and she leaves a legacy of successful initiatives from Sarasota to Tallahassee to Washington, D.C. I am very proud to have had her lead our public affairs team.”

In our next newsletter we’ll talk more about the work of our new Grassroots Outreach Manager, Caitlyn Miller, as well as our new Vice President of Public Policy and Communications, whom we’ll be hiring in the next few weeks. We talked with Wendy about her tenure at Planned Parenthood, as well as what she’s looking forward to next.

What are some of your fondest memories here?

The growth of the affiliate has been unbelievable – from all of us stuffed into 1958 Prospect Street to this amazing three-story headquarters building. Also, the innumerable rallies we held for women’s reproductive rights – from the streets of Sarasota to the steps of Tallahassee’s capitol, to the mall in Washington, D.C. in 2004. Our advocates and supporters are the best anywhere – dedicated to our mission and full of energy!

What are your plans after June 30?

Politics! I’ll still be consulting with Planned



Parenthood, and my first assignment will be to help coordinate a Planned Parenthood rally at the Republican National Convention in Tampa in late August.

What will you miss about this position?

I’ll miss my colleagues, our volunteers and our advocates – and I’ll miss being able to say “I work for Planned Parenthood,” which has always made me so proud.

Anything else you’d like to share with your Public Affairs volunteer team?

Retired or not, I’m not done: I’ll be working with all of you to defeat bad bills, support good bills and always protect our right to choice!

Medical update: *No more yearly paps!*



Over the last decade, more and more studies have shown us that pap smears (cervical cancer screening tests) don't need to be done yearly. Research has found that decreasing the frequency of pap smears to once every 3 years still provides for early detection of cervical cancer, but prevents women from having unnecessary testing.

To that end, in March of this year the American Cancer Society, the US Preventive Services Task Force, and The American Society for Colposcopy and Cervical Pathology issued joint guidelines that recommend that women have pap smears starting at age 21 and ending at age 65, and that those tests be done every 3 years. For women over 30 with no history of abnormal paps, who also

have a negative HPV test, the test frequency can be decreased to every 5 years.

For most women, this is a big change from what they've been told in the past. When presented with this information, many women are thrilled to avoid an unnecessary test and others want to talk with their provider to make sure that less frequent testing will be appropriate for their situation. Regardless of their response to this change, however, it is important for women to remember that even though they may not require a pap smear every year, they should still have regular medical care. This may include breast examinations, blood pressure screening and sexually transmitted infection testing, as well as other preventive services.



Planned Parenthood encourages community to 'GYT' (Get Yourself Tested)

On April 24, six Planned Parenthood of Southwest and Central Florida health centers offered free chlamydia/gonorrhea and HIV testing (the state Department of Health test) and rapid HIV tests at a steeply discounted rate. More than 150 patients took part in GYT, a national campaign supported by a broad coalition of partners, including Planned Parenthood Federation of America, the Kaiser Family Foundation and MTV, designed to address the high rates of STDs among those under 25. In Sarasota, our SOURCE Theatre presented "The First Time Club," an HIV awareness play, in conjunction with the GYT campaign.

EHR initiative ‘takes off’

On April 9, Planned Parenthood of Southwest and Central Florida took flight on the *Starship Speculum* and implemented our Enterprise Practice Management System (EPM), the first part of our full transition to Electronic Health Records (EHR). Under the direction of our “Admiral” and VP of Finance Pauline Parrish and our 10 “Starship Officers,” we have enjoyed a smooth inaugural ride. Our patient services, finance, and IT (information technology) staff have worked tirelessly and invested hundreds of hours to make this launch successful. As we look toward 2013 and the full implementation of EHR, we continue to customize our system, finding new shortcuts that make our daily tasks simpler and help us best serve our patients.

This progress is particularly exciting because our patient software now provides for data continuity with the majority of our sister Planned

Parenthood affiliates. Since most of our patients are between the ages of 18-34, this network will help them to easily maintain their healthcare as they move within our service area and throughout the country, and will facilitate new patients’ transition into our affiliate.

Our two-year EHR implementation is budgeted to cost just under \$900,000, including servers, desktops, tablets, software, ongoing staff training and costs associated with implementing any new systems and procedures – and migrating information on our current 27,000 patients to the new system. During the past six months we have raised – through grants, pledges and gift designations – more than \$630,000; we invite our community of supporters and advocates to invest in our 21st century EHR system to guarantee that we can continue to serve our patients after the Affordable Care Act takes effect.

Education and Outreach **UPDATES**

We've been thrilled at the growth of our Voices for Planned Parenthood, or "VOX" chapters at college campuses throughout our affiliate, and welcomed them to a training at Eckerd College in February. VOX members worked with our Outreach Educators to develop plans for outreach on campus, talked about upcoming events they wanted to host, and expressed their desire to further expand their knowledge of our medical services. As you can see from our County Updates, these chapters have had a full schedule of activities!

In addition to working with VOX chapters, our Outreach Educators have been expanding their marketing efforts within the community. Staff members have been working with volunteers in the health centers to conduct patient surveys on our programs, services and marketing efforts; the team is looking forward to working on a voter engagement initiative, set to launch this summer.

We're also exploring new partnerships: Kathy Dobson has been working with the Polk County band "Black Tides Roll" – she describes them as a "30- to 40-something band of hard rocker guys."



The SOURCE Theatre and Video Productions recently won three ADDY Awards from the American Advertising Federation-Suncoast. The local competition is the first level of the advertising industry's largest and most representative creative competition. The SOURCE, led by producer/director KT Curran, won Silver ADDYs for its HIV prevention PSA, "There Was That Time"; for "Ask Her," a PSA about prescription drug overdose; and an ADDY for a series of four PSAs on substance abuse. All of the PSAs were written and produced with the help of our amazing SOURCE volunteers, who worked long hours on these projects. All of the commercials have been shown on TV, on the Internet, and in local high schools for thousands of young adults in our community.

Jodie and Jan were first brought in to Planned Parenthood by their friend and fellow volunteer Carolyn Fitzpatrick – they soon found their calling as “Condom Queens,” and have made sure that we always have leis at hand!

Since that fateful beginning, they’ve continued to volunteer regularly, coming in to stock up on supplies while delivering countless hangers full of leis. They’ve also upgraded our methods by using a special needle (originally used for sewing dolls) to string the condoms more quickly, and have helped out with numerous other outreach projects. We’re so thankful for this wonderful team and all they do for us.

Jodie was born and raised in Yorba Linda, Calif., where she lived until she graduated from Mexico City College (now the University of the Americas) in 1950. She pursued a career in insurance, spent a number of years at home with her children, and started her own company (Jodie’s Kitchen), which she sold in 1985. After her husband passed away in 2010, she moved to Sarasota to be closer to her daughter, Jan. She feels that Planned Parenthood “fills a very important need in a way that no other organization does.”

Jan was born in California and grew up north of Chicago, Ill. where her parents’ involvement in various community activities laid a foundation for giving back that influenced both her and her sister. She has fond memories of using Planned Parenthood herself, and also says that “the work done at Planned Parenthood – fundraising, education, advocacy, and access to women’s health – is so important for all of us.”

After being transferred from Chicago to Sarasota, Jan has embraced the challenge of raising awareness in this more conservative political climate (and seeing palm trees every day has helped to make those conversations a bit more pleasant).

Annual Dinner Celebration

On March 6, we held our Annual Dinner Celebration, our largest annual fundraiser, at the Sarasota Municipal Auditorium. The evening brought together 530 friends for a catered dinner, silent auction and words of inspiration, courtesy of Planned Parenthood Federation of America President Cecile Richards. Prior to the main event, Richards and affiliate CEO Barbara Zdravecky addressed sponsors and members of the local media at a sponsor reception/press conference, discussing state and national legislation impeding women's access to health

care; the Komen defunding controversy; and how Planned Parenthood is changing its business model to address the Affordable Health Care Act.

Our main event opened with a rousing march into the venue as Voices for Planned Parenthood (VOX) participants, members of the affiliate's SOURCE Theatre group and performers from the Westcoast Black Theatre Troupe held "I Stand with Planned Parenthood" signs and belted out "Brand New Day" from "The Wiz." The audience sprang to their feet and cheered the youth advocates on. Noted journalist and civil libertarian Robyn Blumner was honored for her work, her courage and her unwavering belief in human rights. It was a tremendously successful night for Southwest and Central Florida – we netted over \$140,000. This “Baby Think It Over” program is the final step of their course – bringing what they’ve learned in classroom out into the rest of their lives. Most of the students have very similar reactions: they just can’t believe how much work it is!

Kathy also serves as the staff liaison for our Voices for Planned Parenthood (VOX) chapter on the USF Polytechnic campus. At the USF Polytechnic’s awards ceremony on April 27, our VOX group won two well-deserved awards. It was honored with the Best New Organization and the all-around Most Outstanding Organization. Cocktail Party Conversation

You're at your neighbor's gossipy summer cocktail party, and you've found yourself standing next to Blanche. She's a talker, all right, and tonight she's running on and on about a *New York Times* guest column she just read by a woman who had had an abortion and was unapologetic about it. Blanche tells you that if she ever had an abortion ("and I certainly haven't!"), she'd be too ashamed ever to talk about it, let alone write a column. You thought that the columnist was saying something that was long overdue. You say to Blanche:

“You know, I recently learned that one in three American women has an abortion by the time she reaches the age of 45. Abortion, Blanche, is common — and legal! Yet it's surrounded by a culture of shame promoted by people who don't believe women should have control over their own bodies and their own personal decisions. Having an abortion shouldn't be a shameful secret. Acknowledging it helps support honest discourse and enables women to take ownership of our decisions and our bodies. Those who want to share their experiences should not be ashamed of making that choice. As the woman who wrote that guest column stated, 'I don't have to be ashamed or terrified, because brave women before me fought to make abortion legal, have gone public with their stories of shame and terror [when abortion was illegal] and made sure that no woman ever again has to die from a back-alley abortion or bear an unwanted child.'”
