On Friday, February 18th, the **U.S. House of Representatives passed HR 1**, a fiscal year 2011 resolution necessary for the continued funding of the Federal government. **If passed by the Senate and signed into law by the President**, HR 1 would eliminate or significantly reduce a number of vital programs across the country. For Planned Parenthood, HR 1 is the worst legislative assault on women's health care in our 95-year history.

What is the impact of HR1 for the women, men and teens of Kentucky and the U.S.?

- The elimination of the national family planning program will hurt women and families, including increasing the number of unintended pregnancies, and have a devastating effect on communities across the nation.
- The House-passed amendment to bar Planned Parenthood from providing health care services through **any** federal program will leave millions of women at risk for serious health problems, including undetected cancers, HIV & other sexually transmitted diseases and infections.
- These proposals will do just the opposite of reducing our nation's

deficit and fixing the economy. For every dollar invested in family planning, taxpayers **save** nearly \$4 in other health care costs.

In a vote by the US Senate on March 9, 2011, **HR 1 was defeated.**

However, the U.S. Senate also failed to pass their alternative. This alternative resolution would continue to fund Title X at current levels and would NOT include language to defund Planned Parenthood.

A Congressional vote provided for continued funding of the Federal government only through April 8th. A new funding resolution must be passed prior to April 9 for the Federal government to continue to function.

Health care for thousands of women in Kentucky and millions of women across this country is under attack, and we are here to say **NO. No to taking away family planning and birth control; No to taking away lifesaving cancer screening; No to taking away HIV and other STD testing and treatment.**

Planned Parenthood has launched 3 initiatives in support of access to life saving and life changing services and programs.

Planned Parenthood Truth Tour:

A hot pink tour bus is traveling the country to share information about the important work of PP and the devastating impact of these attacks of family planning.

Kentucky youth rally for sex education

On February 15, thanks to a grant from Planned Parenthood Federation of America, PPKY brought 40 high school and college students to the state Capitol to advocate for comprehensive sex education in Kentucky schools. Unfortunately many Kentucky schools continue to teach ineffective abstinence-only-until-marriage programs despite the fact that the state has the nation’s 8th highest teen birth rate and 7th highest rate of cervical cancer.

Participating youth represented 9 high schools and 3 universities from across the state. PPKY teenREACH peer educators and UK VOX members were among those in attendance, as well as UofL Medical Students for Choice. Two weeks prior to the rally day, youth attended an advocacy training where PPKY staff and peer educators, along with guest speakers from the ACLU, Kentucky Fairness and the Center for Women and Families, offered sessions on how a bill becomes a law (Advocacy 101), the current state of reproductive health in Kentucky, and relevant legislation (sex education,

teen dating violence, and LGBTQ rights). Youth also made signs for the rally and practiced speaking to law-makers.

As part of Rally Day, youth met with individual legislators and other government officials, and wrote more than 60 letters for those they were unable to meet with, sharing their experiences receiving or not receiving sex education in school.

PPKY’s youth joined the local chapter of the ACLU’s Reproductive Freedom Project for a noon rally in the Rotunda. More than 125 youth and adults from across the state, including several legislators and government officials, joined together in support of comprehensive sex education and Planned Parenthood.

The event was covered by TV stations from both Louisville and Lexington. The entire group was equipped with hot pink “Sex Education NOW” t-shirts and held signs that read “Protect our Future” and “I Stand With Planned Parenthood.”

Despite a small group of anti-choice protestors, the Youth Rally Day was an overwhelming success. The energy in the Rotunda was electric. Words such as “passionate”, “articulate”, “knowledgeable”, “energizing”, and “our future legislators” were repeatedly stated and heard by those in attendance.
