## Client Information Comparison of Abortion Options



If you are pregnant, you have 3 options – abortion, adoption, and parenting. We can talk about any of these options with you, and can help you with whatever you decide to do.

	Abortion Pill  Medication abortion	<b>In-Clinic Abortion</b> Aspiration abortion
How well does it work?	Works about 98% of the time.	Works over 99% of the time.
When can it be done?	Up to 9 weeks.	Up to 20 weeks.
How does it happen?	<ul> <li>In the clinic, you take mifepristone (the abortion pill).</li> <li>At home, you take misoprostol pills 24 to 48 hours later to pass the pregnancy tissue.</li> <li>You come back to the clinic for a follow-up ultrasound or blood draw about a week later to make sure it worked.</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>In the clinic, the doctor or nurse wi use gentle suction to remove the pregnancy tissue.</li> <li>You will be in a recovery area until it's safe to go home, usually after 15 to 45 minutes.</li> <li>In most cases, no follow-up appointment is needed.</li> </ul>
How long does it take?	Usually within 24 hours, but it can take up to several days.	About 10 minutes.
How will I feel?	You'll start to have strong cramps and bleeding within 1 to 4 hours after taking the misprostol. You may have cramping on and off for 1 or 2 more days.  You may also have:  A fever of 99-100° F Dizziness Diarrhea Back pain Nausea or vomiting	You may feel:  Mild to moderate cramping during and after the abortion. Cramping on and off may last for 1 or 2 more days.  Tired (from medicines used).
What can I do for pain?	Pain medicines v	vill be available.
How much will I bleed? For how long?	Heavy bleeding with clots is common after taking misoprostol. Bleeding may continue on and off for 4 to 6 weeks.	Light or medium bleeding for 1 to 7 days is common. Bleeding may continue on and off for 4 to 6 weeks.
What are the benefits?	<ul> <li>It may feel more natural, like a miscarriage.</li> <li>Being at home may be more private and comfortable for you.</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>It is over in a few minutes.</li> <li>You may have less bleeding than you would with the abortion pill.</li> <li>Clinic staff is there to support you.</li> </ul>
What are the risks?	If it doesn't work, you may need to have an aspiration procedure to complete the process.	<ul> <li>Possible injury to the uterus or other organs.</li> <li>If it doesn't work, you may need to have another aspiration procedure to complete the process.</li> </ul>
	For both procedures, risks include:	
	<ul> <li>Heavy bleeding</li> <li>Blood clots in the uterus</li> <li>Infection</li> <li>Pregnancy tissue left in the uterus</li> </ul>	<ul><li>Continuing pregnancy</li><li>Allergic reactions to drugs used</li><li>Death</li></ul>
