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Mission Statement

Planned Parenthood of Illinois (PPIL) believes that reproductive self-determination, with effective sexuality education and access to family planning and related services, is necessary to enhance the quality of life, preserve individual opportunity and serve the interests of the family.

Based on this belief, PPIL's mission is to:

Provide, or cause to be provided, effective reproductive health services, especially for those who do not have adequate resources in settings which preserve and protect the privacy, dignity and essential rights of the individual.

Provide, or cause to be provided, education which ensures an understanding of sexuality and its implications for the individual, the family and society.

Initiate, advocate and cause to be implemented, public and private policies which guarantee reproductive self-determination and the services and resources necessary to insure it.

A Connected Community

Like most of the nation, Illinois has been hit hard by the economic downturn. As a result, women have been forced to make extremely difficult decisions about their health care. According to the Guttmacher Institute, nearly one in four women have put off a gynecologic or birth control visit in the past year to save money, and the same numbers said they had a harder time paying for birth control than they did in the past.

Nearly half of the women in the Guttmacher survey said they wanted to delay pregnancy or limit the number of children they have because of economic concerns. This puts women in a double-bind – they want to avoid unintended pregnancies, but they are having a difficult time affording the birth control to do so.

Yet, PPIL continues to provide quality, affordable health care to thousands of women, men and teens each year. Over sixty percent of our patients live at or below the federal poverty level, and without PPIL, many of them would slip through the cracks of the health care system.

We derive our strength because of the deep ties that our health centers have in the communities in which we serve – whether it's from the care we provide, grassroots and advocacy outreach or educational programming – the women and families throughout Illinois know that Planned Parenthood is the most trusted provider of reproductive health care.

PPIL has spent this past year working to ensure that we remain the state's foremost provider of reproductive health care services. To that end, we have expanded new services at our health centers, including rapid HIV testing and the HPV vaccine. We now have a unified clinical management system that allows us to provide coordinated, seamless quality care for our patients across the state. And several of our health centers received critical upgrades, expansions and new facilities, including Peoria, Effingham, Pekin and Near North.

Last year, we enrolled more than 8,100 women in the state's Medicaid family planning waiver, Illinois Healthy Women (IHW) – more than any other health care provider in the state. IHW provides preventative family planning and reproductive health care services to low-income women without any premiums, deductibles or co-pays required.

We also won a big victory in the courts in March when a federal judge ruled that emergency contraception (also known as Plan B) must be made available over-the-counter to women age 17 and older, a significant step in putting women's health ahead of politics.

Our success continued in the Illinois General Assembly where the Reproductive Health and Access Act garnered 35 co-sponsors in the House and was passed out of the Human Services Committee by a 5-2 vote.

This comprehensive legislation bars the government from interfering with anyone's ability to use birth control, carry a pregnancy to term or terminate a pregnancy. The bill requires all Illinois public schools to teach medically accurate, age appropriate, comprehensive sex education. And it makes sure that government-funded health care programs, like Medicaid, cover basic reproductive health care services like family planning, prenatal care, and pap tests as they do for other health care services.

While we still have significant work to do, the progress we made in Springfield this past year lays a solid foundation for moving RHAA forward.

Three of our peer educators were also awarded scholarships to attend PPFA's Young Leaders Summit in Houston in March, providing them with the opportunity to enhance their peer leadership skills in sexual health education – and meet Secretary of State Hillary Clinton!

On a personal note, after nearly 22 years at Planned Parenthood – first PP/CA and now PPIL – Steve has left us to join Planned Parenthood Northern New England (PPNNE). It is a bittersweet farewell because while his leadership and dedication will be greatly missed, we are glad he is staying within the Planned Parenthood family. While PPNNE is fortunate to be gaining such an inspired leader, we know that PPIL will continue to thrive as one of the preeminent affiliates in the country.

Our Communities

Aurora

- Population: 171,782
- Known as “The City of Lights,” Aurora was one of the first cities in the U.S. to implement an all-electric street lighting system in 1881.
- Currently, Aurora is one of the fastest growing cities in the U.S. and the second largest city in Illinois.
- Aurora is home to PPIL’s newest health center, a 22,000 square foot, state-of-the-art facility that opened on October 3, 2007.
- 17% of Aurora patients are Hispanic – the largest percentage of any PPIL health center.

Bloomington

- Population: 73,026
- Known as the “Beer Nut Capital of the World,” Bloomington is the only place in the world where beer nuts are manufactured.
- Planned Parenthood has been providing reproductive health services in Bloomington since the 1970s.
- The Bloomington health center is supported by federal Title X funds and is the only Title X funded family planning provider in McLean County. All patients are accepted at the health center regardless of their ability to pay.
- Bloomington’s Peer Education Program was established in 1987. PPIL peer educators are high school students who are trained to teach comprehensive sex education to their communities.

Champaign

- Population: 79,389
- Originally called "West Urbana," Champaign was renamed when it acquired a city charter in 1860.
- Planned Parenthood has been providing reproductive health care services in Champaign since 1940.
- The Champaign health center is supported by federal Title X funds. All patients are accepted at the health center regardless of their ability to pay.
- The Champaign health center is one of only four abortion providers in downstate and central Illinois.
- Champaign's Peer Education Program was established in 1999. PPIL peer educators are high school students who are trained to teach comprehensive sex education to their communities.

Chicago

- Population: 2,853,114
- Known as the "Windy City" and the "Second City," Chicago is the 3rd largest city in the U.S.
- The Illinois Birth Control League brought family planning services to Chicago in 1923. Planned Parenthood was incorporated as an affiliate in 1947.
- In 1984, eleven years after Roe v. Wade made abortion legal, Planned Parenthood made this service available and affordable in Chicago.
- Chicago is home to seven PPIL health centers in the Austin, Loop, Englewood, Near North, Rogers Park, Roseland and Wicker Park neighborhoods.
- The Austin, Englewood and Roseland health centers are supported by federal Title X funds. All patients are accepted at the health centers regardless of their ability to pay.

Clinton

- Population: 7,154
- Located in DeWitt County, the city and county are named after DeWitt Clinton, New York's governor from 1817 to 1823.
- The annual Apple n' Pork Festival draws 70,000 people to Clinton during the last weekend of September.
- Planned Parenthood has been providing reproductive health services in Clinton for over 20 years.
- The Clinton health center is supported by federal Title X funds. All patients are accepted at the health center regardless of their ability to pay.

Decatur

- Population: 76,256
- Decatur's motto is "Illinois' Central City," but it is more commonly referred to as the "Soybean Capital of the World."
- Decatur was Abraham Lincoln's first home in Illinois – his family settled just west of the city in 1830.
- Planned Parenthood has been providing reproductive health services in Decatur since 1967.
- The Decatur health center is supported by federal Title X funds. All patients are accepted at the health center regardless of their ability to pay.
- Decatur's Peer Education Program was established in 1984. PPIL peer educators are high school students who are trained to teach comprehensive sex education to their communities.

Effingham

- Population: 12,489
- Known as “The Crossroads of Opportunity,” Effingham is located at the intersection of major highways I-57 and I-70.
- The city is named after Edward Effingham, a general in the British army who resigned his commission in 1775 because he refused to serve in the war against the Colonies.
- Planned Parenthood has been providing reproductive health services in Effingham for nearly 20 years.
- The Effingham health center is supported by federal Title X funds and is the only Title X funded provider of family planning services in Effingham County. All patients are accepted at the health center regardless of their ability to pay.

Orland Park/ Schaumburg Express Health Centers

- Orland Park Population: 55,514
- Schaumburg Population: 71,716
- John Humphrey was credited with founding modern Orland Park in 1879.
- Schaumburg was originally called “Sarah’s Grove.” The name was changed in 1850 in honor of Schaumburg-Lippe, Germany.
- Planned Parenthood began offering services in Schaumburg in 2004 and in Orland Park in 2006.
- Schaumburg and Orland Park are home to PPIL’s Express Health Centers. The Express Health Centers offer comprehensive contraceptive services, STI testing and treatment, HIV testing, and pregnancy testing and counseling.

Ottawa

- Population: 19,419
- Ottawa was host to the famous Lincoln-Douglas debates of 1858.
- Ottawa is known as the scenic gateway to Starved Rock State Park, the most popular state park in Illinois.
- Planned Parenthood has been providing reproductive health services in Ottawa for more than 20 years.
- The Ottawa health center serves the highest percentage of male patients of any PPIL health center. PPIL’s male services include physical examinations and STI testing and treatment.



Pekin

- Population: 33,430
- Known as the “Marigold Capital of the World,” Pekin hosts an annual Marigold Festival in honor of former U.S. Senator Everett Dirksen, who unsuccessfully attempted to make the marigold the national flower during his term.
- In 1862, the first council of the Union League Club of America was formed in Pekin.
- Planned Parenthood first came to Tazewell County in 1977. During its first year, 88 patients were served.
- The Pekin health center is supported by Title X funds and is the only Title X provider in Tazewell County. All patients are accepted at the health center regardless of their ability to pay.

Peoria

- Population: 114,114
- Peoria has become famous as a representation of the average American city. The saying, "Will it play in Peoria?" was coined on the vaudeville circuit.
- Theodore Roosevelt called Grandview Drive, a Peoria street overlooking the Illinois River, the "world's most beautiful drive" during a visit in 1920.
- The first Peoria Planned Parenthood health center, located at the Methodist Hospital, opened on September 2, 1965. During its first year, 128 patients were served.
- The Peoria health center is supported by federal Title X funds. All patients are accepted at the health center regardless of their ability to pay.

Springfield

- Population: 117,352
- Springfield was originally called "Calhoun" after Vice President John C. Calhoun. As public sentiment turned against Calhoun, the city was renamed Springfield.
- In 1837, Springfield became Illinois' state capitol.
- Family planning services first came to Springfield in 1937 when the "Maternal Health Center" opened. During its first year, 150 patients were served.
- The Springfield health center is supported by federal Title X funds. All patients are accepted at the health center regardless of their ability to pay.
- Springfield is home to PPIL's legislative affairs office, which advocates for policies that protect and enhance access to reproductive health care services and education.




