

A total of 350 parents were recruited by professional sample partners and completed the online survey between March 2 and March 19, 2018, who qualified for the study if they:

- Live in Austin Texas
- Have one or more children 18 or younger living at home
- Have children who attend elementary school, middle school, and/or high school
- Have children who attend classes at the Austin Independent School District

The survey was offered in Spanish and English, with every participant given the opportunity to select the language with which they were most comfortable. A total of 21 participants took the survey in Spanish and 329 took the survey in English. The margin of error, calculated at a 95% confidence level, is 5.23% for this study.

The survey was commissioned by Planned Parenthood of Greater Texas.

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
